Message from Chief James Ison

Greetings,

It is my pleasure to present the citizens of Greenwood with the 2022 Greenwood Police Department Annual Report. This report highlights some of our 2022 accomplishments, services provided, community events, and crime statistics. The purpose of this report is to maintain accountability and transparency to those we serve.

Looking back, 2022 was one of the most challenging years in the history of the Greenwood Police Department. We experienced the loss of an active duty police officer in early July. Two weeks later our officers responded to one of the most tragic events in our cities history when a gunman opened fire inside the food court of the Greenwood Park Mall. The shooter killed three innocent people and injuring several others. The resolve and resiliency of our officers shined bright during these dark times. They performed courageously and did remarkable things in the face of adversity and chaos.

In 2022, we had six retirements. These six officers had a combined 146 years of experience. We also welcomed seven new officers to the ranks. Much like other law enforcement agencies around the country we have experienced increased difficulty in recruiting and hiring new officers. In 2022, we re-vamped our recruiting efforts by producing a recruitment video, advertising outside of Indiana, utilizing marketing and advertising strategies that target individuals with law enforcement and military backgrounds, and working with local universities that have criminal justice programs.

In an effort to improve upon our community engagement, we held our first Greenwood Police Citizens
Academy in August. This ten week course provides citizens classroom and practical experiences relating to the
day to day operations of the police department. Some of the topics discussed were: criminal law, traffic stops,
use of force, policy & procedure, tours of the Johnson County Jail, and "shoot don't shoot" scenarios. This was
a huge success and received wonderful feedback from the twenty attendees.

Law enforcement agencies around the country are experiencing more calls for service resulting from people experiencing mental health crisis. In 2022, all Greenwood officers became certified in Crisis Intervention training or "CIT". This training focuses on developing collaborative relationships between law enforcement, mental health providers, and individuals impacted by mental illness. In short it gives officers the tools and knowledge needed to achieve more positive outcomes when dealing with people suffering from mental illness.



The Investigations Division consists of trained investigators that are primarily responsible for the investigation of major crimes and processing scenes for evidence committed against people or property in the City of Greenwood.






Budget Information

The approved Greenwood Police Department budget for 2022 was \$7,511,191. This was less than a 1% increase from the 2021 budget. Personnel services accounted for the majority of the budget at \$6,635,021 or 88%. The operations portion of the budget, including equipment, supplies, maintenance and repairs totaled \$876,170 or just about 12%.

Law Enforcement Code of Ethics

AS A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all people in liberty, equality and justice.

I WILL keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others.

I WILL be honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life; I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I WILL never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with the relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I RECOGNIZE the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I KNOW that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

SWAT Team

Special Weapons and Tactics Officers are members of a highly trained unit who respond to situations that require tactical expertise beyond the scope of routine patrol duties.


The SWAT team is called in when an incident presents significant risk to law enforcement officers or the public. These officers use their advanced training in weapons, teamwork, and strategy to resolve crises.



The majority of our officers have an Associate, Bachelors or Master's Degree from an accredited college.




Average Number of Years 10





In 2022, 51% of the reported crimes were against property.












Criminal Arrests







Accidents

In 2022, there were a total of 2,429 reported accidents. Of the reported accidents, 1,575 required an Indiana State Accident Report. If estimated damages are less than \$1,000 or the accident occurred on private property, officers are not required to complete a state accident report. The total number of accidents which did not require a state accident report were 854.

Below are the top ten Primary Causes of Accidents reported to the State of Indiana.






Breakdown of the different types of accidents reported to the State of Indiana.

When a Greenwood Police Officer uses any type of force, they are required to complete a Use of Force Report. There were a total of 84 reports filled out in 2022.


USE OF FORCE BREAKDOWN
