

Budget and Staffing

The Greenwood Police Department operating budget for 2024 was \$9,025,277. This was a 7.8% increase from the 2023 budget. The cost of health insurance benefits for Police Department Employees was \$1,944,271.

As of December 31, 2024, the department was staffed with 77 Police Officers and 9 full time civilian positions.



Mission Statement



Law Enforcement Code of Ethics

AS A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all people in liberty, equality and justice.

I WILL keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others.

I WILL be honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life; I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I WILL never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with the relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I RECOGNIZE the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I KNOW that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

SWAT Team

The SWAT Team is a specialized unit that uses special tactics and weapons to resolve incidents exceeding the training and equipment capabilities of patrol officers. The team is staffed with 15 operational members whose specialized training includes over 680 hours of combined training in 2024. The SWAT team is called in when an incident presents significant risk to law enforcement officers or the public. These officers use their advanced training in weapons, teamwork and strategy to resolve crises.













K-9 Unit

The Greenwood Police Department K-9 Unit and their handlers are a highly trained team and receive ongoing monthly training. This is conducted through the application of Police Service Dogs in the areas of Criminal Apprehensions, Narcotics Detections, Public Presentations & Community Events, Evidence Searches, Building & Area Searches and Lost and Missing Persons.










Calls for Service

Calls for service are defined as activities to which officers are dispatched or self-initiated. In 2024, Greenwood Officers responded to 29,594 calls for service, which is 37% of all calls in Johnson County.



Criminal Arrests

In 2024, a total of 2,486 people were arrested in Greenwood. Most types of arrests are drugs, thefts and driving offense. Below is a breakdown of those types of arrests. Non-Greenwood residents accounted for 63% of the arrested individuals.

A total of 499 Arrest Warrant Requests were submitted for prosecution.



Traffic Enforcement



Primary Cause of Accident




Citations Issued





Warnings Issued






Use of Force

When a Greenwood Police Officer uses any type of force, they are required to complete a Use of Force Report. There were a total of 95 Use of Force incidents in 2024.


USE OF FORCE BREAKDOWN



What is Use of Force?

Amount of effort required by police to compel compliance by an unwilling subject.

Some examples of physical force are Joint Manipulation, Weight Leverage, Wrist Lock, Balance Displacement and Pressure Points.
